



Baby Blue Eyes Planting Guide

About Baby Blue Eyes

Baby Blue Eyes are hardy, trailing, annual flowers native to California, but will grow prolifically throughout the rest of the United States as well. An extremely colorful wildflower that is rather easy to grow, Baby Blue Eyes remains one of our favorite all-purpose wildflowers!

When to Plant

Direct sow your seeds in spring to early summer after temperatures consistently reach at least 68 degrees F.

Where to Plant

Baby Blue Eyes thrive in full sun or partial shade areas with fertile, moist, well-drained soils. They are ideal for beds and borders, hanging baskets, garden edging, as ground cover, and in city or rock gardens. Avoid transplanting, as disturbing the roots of these flowers will upset their growth cycle.

How to Plant

Prepare your garden with loosened soil that is weed free. Plant seeds about 6-12" apart and cover with about 1/8" of soil. Keep seeds moist until germination (about 10-20 days) and then add water-soluble, all-purpose plant food before blooms appear.

Caring for Baby Blue Eyes

Mature plants tolerate drought well, but will benefit from occasional watering. Fertilizer is rarely necessary after the first blooms, but if you're noticing wilting in your plants, provide them with more afternoon shade or consider deadheading your plant to prevent excessive self-sowing.
