



Black Eyed Susan Planting Guide

About Black Eyed Susans

The Black Eyes Susan is a timeless classic for gardeners all over the world. These roots bring you the always-loved garden hues that bring pollinators to your garden and keep deer away. They get between 2-3 feet tall and bloom profusely.

When to Plant

Plant as soon as possible, after the threat of frost has passed

Where to Plant

Black Eyed Susans thrive in full sun conditions. They also do well in a wide range of soils from clay to loam. If you have sandy soil prone to drying out, amend the soil with organic matter.

How to Plant

Make a hole a few inches wider than your Black Eyed Susan roots. Place the roots in the hole -- disturbing them with your fingers if they're coming in thickly, then back fill the hole, compress, and water the area well.

Caring for Black Eyed Susans

Be sure to remove faded and dying flowers to extend the blooming period. If Black Eyes Susans are deadheaded, a second bloom may appear in the fall.
